The First Responder Team is made up of retired EMT/ Paramedics, nurses/nurse practitioners, and an Emergency Room Doctor. Our intent is to respond to medical emergencies and accidents within our community. We work in partnership with the Red Cross, the local Clinic, Fire Dept. and Police. We can be reached through Rescue One or by telephone to any individual member.



The two fire trucks purchased by donations from our community are in active service. These vehicles provide a valuable service to Kino Viejo and Nuevo. Visit the Fire station in Kino Viejo and check out the sparkling clean red trucks that your donations made possible.

A New Resource for the People of Old Kino

“To support the neediest families, give them space to grow and develop, allowing each to live with human dignity and contribute to a better society”

That is the mission statement of the Don Juan Navarette Foundation. Established by a group of concerned Hermosillo citizens in 1998, this non-faith-based organization has opened a Centro de Integración Familiar (Family Center) in Old Kino. Inaugurated in November 2005, this center is the fourth in Sonora. The building is located in the Barrio Carnavalito. These centers will become the focal points of the community. The Foundation is a registered non-profit and receives help from: Rotary International, Quaker/Gamesa, Coppel, Los Angelitos and Club Deportivo.

The first program offered in Old Kino is a breakfast for needy primary school children. There are two servings: One at 7:00 a.m. for the children who have morning school, the other at 8:00 a.m. for those who attend afternoon school. As many as 70 children are fed

each morning, six days a week. The 1 peso fee for the meal is overlooked for those with no funds. Mothers of the children all must volunteer to help prepare the breakfast. The menu varies with the different food items that have been donated or purchased. Each breakfast provides the necessary nutrition for growing children: milk, cereal, hotcakes, fresh fruit, yogurt, eggs and wieners. Some of the food is obtained from the Food Bank in Hermosillo. More children could be fed if the Center had a bus to transport children from the other barrios. They have also identified five children in wheel chairs who are unable to attend.

Other programs will begin as the Family Center becomes more established: summer day camp, drug and alcohol counseling, health and nutrition, doctor consultations and no-cost medicine, food for senior citizens, and sports. Fundación Don Juan Navarrete has a professional staff including social workers and psychiatrists to assist the four centers. More than 30% of the families in Old Kino are single parent. Seventy percent of the families suffer

from violence, either to the mother or the children. These family centers will help the mothers protect themselves and the family from further violence.

They are also providing courses for the mothers to help them become independent.

Present plans call for three more centers in Hermosillo to open by the end of this year and another Family Center in Kino. Each facility is expected to raise funds and be somewhat independent. Presently Kino is receiving funds from the Foundation. The volunteers who work at the Kino Family Center, named “Esperanza” (hope), need help. Most are single mothers and have little or no organizational experience. The foreign community could help in many ways: cash donations, mentoring mothers and children, providing a bus and helping with ideas to make them self sufficient. All funds contributed in Kino will remain in Kino.

Kino has four patronatos (sponsors) of this program. If you would like to help please contact: Carmen (Grocery store by the billiards hall), Ricarda (Pharmacy) and Marv and Zee Kemel (carton king).

Unique tours of the facility are being conducted by Marv and Zee. We meet at the center, receive more information, visit with the mothers, children and volunteers, watch a multi-media presentation, and eat breakfast alongside the kids. We have had three of these “tours” and all have found them to be a moving and somewhat emotional experience. If you are interested in a tour, please contact Marv or Zee at 242-0215. —MK
