The breakfasts, dinners, and the bar generate 62% of the total annual club income. We have a long-term understanding with the local restaurants about the number of Saturday dinners we hold during the season; so we have only two of them per month. Anything that jeopardizes the income from these meals is obviously not good for the club.

Taking all this into consideration, the club has made three evenings each season available for community — recognized charitable events. These events are scheduled on Wednesday evenings during the busier months of our season. All charitable organizations have the same opportunity to request scheduling of their events. An organization makes a request to the board for a dinner date and states their need. The board reviews, then approves or disapproves the request. There are rules or policies that each organization must follow. For example, the organization, after the event, writes a report to the board of directors detailing income, expenses, net profit, and what the net profit is used for.

Our charter does not specifically provide for charitable activities; however, we are involved in many. We have always wanted to be good neighbors in our Bahía Kino community.

Hopefully, this helps you better understand our policy regarding benefit dinners. If you have additional questions, any board member or officer would be able to help you.

Life Jackets Donated for Kino Viejo Fishermen

Following the Kino Viejo panga accident of a few weeks ago in which two Kino fisherman lost their lives, we discovered that the lone survivor of the accident was the only one wearing a life vest. The wearing of life vests has always been a part of their regulations, but it is one that has never been enforced. This tragedy produced a decision by the Port Captain to enforce the rule. The only problem was that most Kino Viejo fisherman did not have the means or the money to obtain these vests.

Immediately, the boaters in our Kino Nuevo community responded to the need and donated approximately 30 life vests. However, when these were delivered to individuals and to the Port Captain for distribution, we discovered that many more would be necessary in order to take care of all the local fisherman needing life vests.

I called our sons, who own a river-running business in Moab, Utah, and enlisted their help. They contacted other rafting and river running companies and were able to locate 125 life vests to be donated for the fishermen of Kino.

Working in cooperation with the Red Cross in Hermosillo and the Port Captain in Kino Viejo, we had the life vests shipped by UPS to a broker in Nogales, AZ. The Red Cross was able to get the jackets across the border and

transported them to Kino. The shipping charges were paid by Club Deportivo.

The life vests were passed out to panga captains and their crews on March 24 at the Port Captain's office. The fishermen's appreciation was very obvious. The distribution was handled by representatives of the Red Cross, the Port Captain, and the following representatives of our Club Deportivo: Jamie Jerdee, Dan Salmen, and Roy Vaughan.

This cooperative effort will allow many Kino fisherman to begin to fish again, and hopefully, will save lives. We know that additional life jackets are still needed, and if you can bring any that you would like to donate when you return next season, please do so.

USED FIREFIGHTING EQUIPMENT NEEDED

News Flashes...

VEHICLE AND TOURIST PERMITS IN SONORA

Many people seem still to be confused about vehicle and tourist permit requirements for traveling in Sonora under the latest regulations. Here is the scoop from the Tourism Department:

Visitors to much of Sonora are now able to drive directly to their destinations without the time-consuming process of obtaining a Federal Vehicle Permit. Visitors entering Mexico through Agua Prieta, Naco, Nogales, Sonoyta or San Luis Colorado, and traveling on or west of Highway 15 as far south as Guaymas, need to show

only proof of residency from the country of origin, a Tourist Visa* to visit Mexico, a driver's license, and proof of vehicle ownership.

Visitors driving to the rest of Sonora (below Agua Prieta/Cananea/Imuris, east of Highway 15, and south of Guaymas) still must obtain a "Solo Sonora" Vehicle Permit, available at either the Kilometer 21 Checkpoint or the Empalme Checkpoint just outside Guaymas. Any vehicle travel into Mexico outside the State of Sonora requires a Federal Vehicle Permit.

*All visitors entering Mexico must obtain a Tourist Visa, available from any Mexican Consulate or at the Kilometer 21

Checkpoint. The visa is valid for up to 6 months, and is good for multiple entries. Visitors staying seven days or fewer in Mexico must obtain the Tourist Visa but are not required to pay a fee.

NEW ATM IN KINO

The Pemex in Old Kino now has an ATM up and running!

PERMIT EXPIRING?

Are you in Mexico on a tourist permit that is about to expire, but you are not ready to leave?

LUAU RIBS

3 lbs. short ribs	2T wine vinegar
1/2 C flour	2T worchestershire
1tsp salt	1/2C honey
1/2tsp pepper	1/4C water
1C ketchup	

Wipe ribs with damp paper towel. Mix flour, salt & pepper; coat ribs. Arrange in large baking dish. Place a sliced onion on top of meat. Mix remaining ingredients and pour over meat. Cover and bake at 350° for 2 hrs. For crisp ribs, remove cover last 30 minutes.

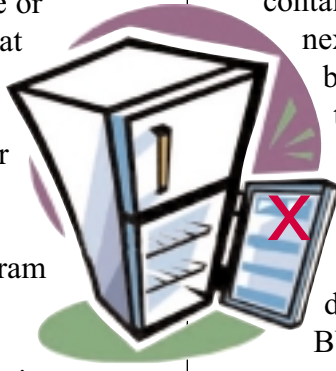

iii DEATH BY ELECTROLYSIS!!!

Several Kino homes have recently suffered water damage from failure of water stops and flexible supply tubes found under sinks and toilets. The fault generally lies with cheapies installed in the past few years. And there’s a very good reason why they fail.

My aged mind still recalls a high school chemistry teacher stressing the periodic table and its application to metals, when all I wanted was to spend time in the outdoors – when I wasn’t ogling girls, that is. Boat owners know what my teacher was saying – that magic occurs when you attach sacrificial zincs to the underwater metal parts of the outdrive. The inexpensive zinc melts away and your expensive boat/motor investment is protected. It has to do with the creation of an electrical current between two dissimilar metals

placed in an electrolyte (e.g. salt-water). Kino’s city water carries sufficient salt to create this electrolysis, and if you’ve installed cheap pot-metal stops and supplies with a high zinc content, you’ll likely suffer the unfortunate consequences recently experienced by at least six of your neighbors.

The supply tubes in question were installed in recent years, and are marked with a regular pattern of red and blue stripes. They start losing flexibility quickly, and one of the ends shears off about a year or two after installation, spraying water all over the house. The water stops are not as easily recognized, but they’re the cheap ones that have become available over the past few years. The good brass ones cost about \$5 each.

Several local home owners first heard of the problem via long-

distance phone call from a friend who saw water pouring out from under their front door. If your home was built, replumbed, or remodeled in the last few years, this is a good time to take a



look under sinks and behind toilets for those telltale flexible tubes with the blue and red stripes, and get them replaced before you leave for the summer. Good quality flexible supply tubes are available from Home Depot, Ace, and Kuroda in Hermosillo. They’re marked with a series of single black stripes; and when you pull on the connector nut, you’ll clearly see a copper neck piece attached to the flexible tube.
